Children have the opportunity to practise skills discreetly through the 'Art and Design Sills' and 'Formal Elements' units. - Our progression of skills document shows the skills that are taught within each year group and how these skills develop to ensure that attainment targets are securely met by the end of each key stage.
- Links have been made to other subjects through our Art and Design curriculum, allowing for cross-curricular learning.
- Lessons are practical in nature and encourage experimental and exploratory learning with all children being given the opportunity to record their ideas through sketchbooks.
- Resources are monitored and replenished each year.
- More able children are idenified and given extra support outside of timetables lessons to further develop their knowledge and skills.
