Dear Parents and Carers

I write to you with some very exciting news! During the Summer Term we will be welcoming Nala, the Therapy Dog, to school.

This decision has been made following extensive research, discussion with other schools who have a School Therapy Dog and approval of the Governing Board. A full risk assessment has been completed which is available to anyone who wishes to have a copy.

Nala is 3 years old and is a Golden Labrador Retriever and belongs to Lancashire Canine Academy. Nala will be accompanied on each visit to school by an accredited dog trainer & behaviour practitioner. Nala is a member of Lancashire Canine Academy's team of therapy dogs, which means she has public liability insurance. Nala regularly goes to the vet for yearly vaccinations, flea and worm treatments.

The children will only be able to interact with her under strict supervision and as long as parental permission has been given. She will initially be in school every Monday afternoon and Thursday afternoon.

When she is moving around the school she will be on a lead and always with her handler. We hope she will be able to support children in school in areas such as reading, nurture groups, with attendance and also being in the quiet areas on the playground.

Numerous research studies have shown the benefits of therapy dogs in schools. Evidence indicates that benefits include:

- Cognitive companionship with a dog stimulates memory, problem-solving and game-playing
- Social a dog provides a positive mutual topic for discussion, encourages responsibility, well-being and focused interaction with others
- Emotional a school dog improves self-esteem, acceptance from others and lifts mood, often provoking laughter and fun. Dogs can also teach compassion and respect for other living things as well as relieving anxiety
- Physical interaction with a furry friend reduces blood pressure, provides tactile stimulation, assists with pain management, gives motivation to move, walk and stimulates the senses
- Environmental a dog in a school increases the sense of a family environment, with all of the above benefits continuing long after the school day is over
- Reading reading to dogs has been proven to help children develop literacy skills and build confidence, through both the calming effect the dog's presence has on children as well as the fact that a dog will listen to children read without being judgemental or critical. This comforting environment helps to nurture children's enthusiasm for reading and provides them with the confidence to read aloud
