Shared Human Experience	To know a rule is an accepted principle or instruction that states the way things are or should be done, and tells you what you are allowed or are not allowed to do To understand that even though we have freedom of speech as a human right we still need rules because rules keep us safe and make sure everyone is treated fairly. Rules also bring order. For example, we could be asked to raise our hand or wait our turn if we are in a group and want to ask something. If there were no rules, everyone would talk at once and nobody would be able to hear what anyone was saying. To know they themselves are rule makers when playing a game. To understand sometimes rules are broken they will be a consequence and laws are more serious if broken. To know sometimes the rules can be broken if s situation arise that is unsafe or is not a child's fault – such as no money for new shoes or shouting if there is a danger To know rules help us feel positive and that it is fair. Beliefs and Values	To know the Torah is a holy text of Judaism, the Torah is made up of the first five books of the Hebrew Bible (which Christians call the Old Testament). These books are Genesis, Exodus, Leviticus, Numbers, and Deuteronomy. The Torah begins with the story of the creation of the world. To understand that it is believed that the Torah was given to Moses when God made a covenant with the Jewish people after they had been freed from slavery in Egypt. The Torah was given to them to be a foundation of how to live as people of God. To know the Torah has The book contains 613 rules that teach people how to live. To know that some of the teaching, rules, of the Torah can be presented to children as examples of ancient wise advice: Do not lie. Honour your parents. Don't be greedy. Love God with all your heart and love your neighbour as much as you love yourself. To understand that stories from the Torah, eg Abraham, Moses all have lessons for Jews and help guide them and live their lives. To know one of the rules is that Jewish people should learn about and study the Torah throughout their lives. They do this by attending the synagogue where the Torah is read aloud and the Rabbi (literally 'teacher') is there to offer insight and guidance into its teaching. 	some Jews use the Torah more strictly than others. For example, some Orthodox Jews believe that it is important to follow every single rule in the Torah. However, Reform Jews tend to follow the rules they feel are most important and disregard some rules they see as outdated. To know that the Torah It is read aloud weekly at the synagogue. 4 Living religious traditions	To know that attending the synagogue gives Jewish people time to focus on God and for the Rabbi and community to pass on religious and moral teachings to the people. To know a congregation's Torah is kept behind the doors of a holy ark. This ark, which can be plain in its design or incredibly ornate, is often found at the very front of the sanctuary, where it can be seen by all. When the Torah is removed from the ark, the congregation rises and remains standing until the scroll is eventually placed upon the "bimah" a synagogue's pulpit. Special prayers are spoken quietly by those near the Torah as it is rested against the right shoulder of a person of honour. Because it is a holy object, the Torah must never touch the ground. When not in use, the Torah remains wrapped in its own fine shawl or covering and is often topped with one or two ornate crowns and a shield. It is an honour to undress and dress the Torah during prayer services in which passages from the scroll are read aloud. When the Torah is being read they must never touch the scroll. Instead, the reader uses a "pointer" called a "yad" to follow the lines of Hebrew from right to left.
