1 Shared Human Experience	To know a temptation is the desire to do something, especially something wrong or unwise To understand our desires can influence our behaviour. We do wrong. To know that stories often contain important truths and messages for people to learn from. Fables are characterised by their moral lessons. These short tales were once passed down as folklore to teach listeners the difference between right and wrong, give advice on proper behaviour and manners, and offer what conduct to live by To understand that these stories can show us that we are not alone, and that other people go through the same things we've been through. They can teach us that it is okay to be different and help us embrace it To know that we do the wrong thing even when we know that it's wrong because we are human and make mistakes. 2 Beliefs and Values	To know the Genesis account of creation - In the beginning when God created the heavens and the earth, the earth was a formless void and darkness covered the face of the deep, while a wind from God swept over the face of the waters. (1) Then God said, "Let there be light;" and there was light To understand 'God say that it was good' means God was happy with his creation To understand that the fall of man, the fall of Adam, or simply the Fall, is a term used in Christianity to describe the transition of the first man and woman from a state of innocent obedience to God to a state of guilty disobedience – Adam and Eve lived in paradise in total innocence until the serpent (the devil) enticed them to eat the forbidden fruit from the tree of knowledge. As punishment for their disobedience, God banished them from Paradise; Temptation - The Garden of Eden The Bible indicates that Adam and Eve had everything they could ever want. Genesis Chapter Two tells us that God placed them into a beautiful garden with rivers and <i>"trees that were pleasing to the eye and good for food."</i> God only had one simple instruction for Adam and Eve. They were free to eat from any tree in the garden, except for one. This tree was referred to as the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. Satan The Bible details how God's enemy, Satan, took the form of a serpent. He tempted Eve, then Adam, to eat the forbidden fruit with a false promise of getting even <i>more</i> than God had already given them. Adam and Eve gave in. They disobeyed God's only instruction. Christians refer to the act of disobeying God's rules as sin. Right from that moment everything changed. 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	because they were feeling ashamed and afraid. God then banished them from His beautiful garden. A path to Heaven Christians believe that Adam and Eve's greatest punishment was separation from God and a broken relationship with Him. This punishment would be passed down to all their relatives. In other words, everyone! Often called the Fall, this event means humans cannot make themselves perfect and obedient enough to get into Heaven when they die. Many years later, Jesus died on the cross and was raised from the dead. The Bible states that this was God's way of making sure people had a path to Heaven, as Jesus had taken the punishment handed on to us from Adam and Eve. Christians believe that it is only possible for us to get into Heaven because Jesus Christ sacrificed himself. Christians believe Jesus took the punishment handed on to us from Adam and Eve. Throughout history, there have been people whose free will has led them to create weapons, start wars and commit crimes. God banished them from the Garden of Eden and sent them into the harsh outside world To understand that Christians believe that Jesus was the 'Second Adam', who put right the relationship with God and died for the forgiveness of the world's sins. Christians believe that the only way to cleanse your soul from sin and to have God's forgiveness is to do these things: To accept that Christ's death on the cross made up for the sins of humankind. To confess their sins and ask for forgiveness. To accept that only God can cure the sin To be baptised		
3 Living religious traditions	To know that the Lord's Prayer is the most widely known prayer in Christianity and is said across most Christian denominations To know the Lord's Prayer, often known Our Father, is a central Christian prayer which Jesus taught as the way to pray To understand that the Lord's Prayer is recited in most Christian services and is a prayer which Jesus used to help teach his followers to pray. The Lord's Prayer is the most important Christian prayer. Apart from the last sentence, it consists of the words Jesus gave directly to his followers. asked by his followers how they should pray, he taught them the Lord's Prayer.

To know that to Christians the Lord's Prayer does the following: It accepts God as holy. It teaches that if everyone followed God's rules, his kingdom would be complete. It asks for the basic things needed to survive
To understand that the Lord's Prayer focuses Christians thoughts on what's important in life by summarising all that they must do to be "good and faithful servants," namely: worship God, accept His will, know His Word, love each other through forgiveness, and resist evil.

To know that modern Christians face temptations such as eating too much, spending too much, laziness, venting on social media, gossiping, feeling jealous, lying or cheating and abusing drugs and alcohol

To understand the 10 Commandments in simple terms are;

1. Put God first
2. No fake gods
3. Respect God's name
4. Respect God's day of rest
5. Respect your parents
6. Do not kill people
7. Respect marriage
8. Do not steal
9. Do not lie
10. Do not be jealous

To know that reconciliation also known as confession in the Roman Catholic Church or Orthodox Christianity people go to confession to say sorry for the wrong (sin) in their lives and to experience God's healing through forgiveness. Confession also permits reconciliation with the Church, which is wounded by the sins people commit.

To understand that in confession, Protestant. Unlike the Catholic and Orthodox faiths, confession in Protestant

	denominations is done directly to God rather than through a priest To understand that in Protestant denomination confession is done directly to God rather than through a priest To know that The Lord's Prayer, in which Jesus taught about forgiveness, is one of the most important prayers in Christianity. It is the responsibility of humanity to forgive sins, as Jesus gave the disciples the commandment to go out, teach and forgive sins. Just as God sent his Son to forgive sins, so Jesus has passed that commandment on to his followers.		
4 Shared Personal Meaning	To know that to forgive means you're letting go of feelings of anger and revenge – resentment To understand that by consistently offering guidance and correction, parents teach children about acceptable and unacceptable behaviour, and that consequences follow actions. By discussing ethical situations and talking about feelings to develop empathy and compassion, parents can help children develop a moral code To know that there are moral absolutes such as murder, stealing, physical abuse etc To understand that some moral absolutes are not as clear – stealing to feed a child, killing in self defence To know that forgiving can help free you from the control of the person who harmed you. Sometimes, forgiveness might even lead to feelings of understanding, empathy and compassion for the one who hurt you. Forgiveness doesn't mean forgetting or excusing the harm done to you To know that Condoning is accepting and allowing something which is wrong. Forgiving is not saying that bad behaviour is acceptable, but is saying that you no longer feel angry about it.
